Improved confidence and resilience of PP pupils

Analysis of Self-esteem Questionnaire scores show that the average scores for these pupils increases steadily as they move through the school. Those pupils leaving in July 2017 had an average score of 17.0 on entry to Year 3 and 17.9 by the end of Year 6.

The vast majority of PP pupils are confident learners who participate fully in the life of the school. They are well-represented on the School Council and as House Captains. They hold positions of responsibility throughout the school, including Back to School Monitors. The improvements seen in attainment and progress are evidence that our PP pupils are confident, resilient learners.

The slight decline in this year's overall attendance is due to a rise in persistent absenteeism. This is predominantly due to families taking term time holidays, none of which have been authorised. For absences due to holiday of 5 days or more, Penalty Notices have been issued. One PP pupil was on a significantly reduced timetable (10 hours per week) for the Spring and Summer term and supported by a range of agencies throughout the EHC assessment process, including the Education Welfare Service.

Extra-curricular opportunities

Funding has been provided to cover the costs of the Year 6 residential for all PP pupils, enabling equity of access to a wide range of outdoor and adventurous activities outside of school, building confidence, raising self-esteem and providing opportunities for teambuilding. Extra-curricular activities, such as Lego, I Rock, Judo, Football and Homework are just some of the clubs accessed by PPG children. Funding has also been provided for Maestros music lessons, instrument hire and insurance. The school meets the cost of trips and all enrichment activities, including fees for PTA events such as Discos.

36 PP pupils participated in at least one extracurricular club this year and all were offered a place at Homework Club.

Parental engagement

The school works hard to cultivate relationships with PP parents, and teachers ensure they engage with them on an informal basis at every opportunity, strengthening partnership working. They regularly celebrate the achievement of PP pupils, sharing work and achievements at least once per month, and not waiting until the termly Parents' Evening.

88% of PP parents attended Parents' Consultations and in 2018, in an attempt to engage some of our harder to reach parents, we made the decision to hold some appointments during the school day. This has proved to be very popular and resulted in increased participation of single parents, and many with pre-school children.

Class assemblies and events such as Sports Day and the Christmas Celebration are very well supported by PP parents.

Prior to 'all' parents being invited to volunteer, parents of PP pupils are asked to help out on trips, at special events and with enrichment activities. We encourage PP parents to apply for vacancies within our organisation and currently employ one as a member of our support staff team.
